FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As I write the welcome letter for this year's annual report I am encouraged by life for all of us becoming more "normal" post-Covid, and our students and their families facing less challenges than the past couple of years, though the nonprofit fundraising world has definitely become more unpredictable than it used to be.

I am also excited about the future for SBSOS. We are now spending three days a week at the YMCA, where one racquetball court will be converted to squash early in the 2023/24 school year, with hopefully more to follow as they see good usage.

Additionally, we are still in talks with the City of Santa Barbara with regard to installing an outdoor squash court (or two) in a local park, and we have quietly started an \$8M capital campaign to fund building our own community squash center!

We continued our 100% high school graduation record with our two seniors -Valentino Martinez and Jasmine DeJesus - heading off to CSU Chico and Santa Barbara City College respectively (see inside this report). This (together with Laguna Blanca School taking another 7th grade SBSOS student on scholarship) means that SBSOS students have now received almost \$5.5 million in private school and college grants and financial aid!

We continue to support 18 college students, and are very proud of our five college graduates – Daisy Altamirano (UC Berkeley 2018) working with underserved students for another nonprofit in Santa Barbara, David Quintero (Bates 2020) working in Miami in Real Estate, Camilla Altamirano (Westmont 2020) working in Los Angeles as a Marketing Director for a beauty company, Zaira Paredes (USC 2021) working in Los Angeles in Stage/Theatre Management, and Merith Velazquez (Lehigh 2022) working in New York in Chemical Engineering.

I was a founding Board Member of SBSOS 18 years ago and have been Executive Director for over 9 years now. I love my job. I am so proud of how far we have come and what we do, and it's heart-warming to hear so many students, both past and current, continually refer to SBSOS as their "second family". If you have not watched our "I Love SBSOS" video please look for it on our website. Every time I watch it I have a big grin on my face.

Thank you for your support, please continue it through these uncertain times, please help us continue to grow, and enjoy reading about our last year in the following pages...

Santa Barbara School of Squash (SBSOS) was founded in 2006 by a small group of Santa Barbara area squash players who recognized the need for expanding youth enrichment opportunities through academics and sport for low-income students committed to self-improvement. SBSOS is based on a "squash and education" model operating successfully in other areas of the country, overseen by the Squash & Education Alliance (SEA).

From humble beginnings with 6 students and an annual budget of \$12K, SBSOS now serves 30+ students from 10 Santa Barbara and Goleta schools, supports 25 students in college and 6 college graduates, and has an annual budget of almost \$300K. We monitor student attendance, grades, behavior, and fitness to document our success. Academic and behavioral progress is tracked through report cards, attendance records, interviews, in-home meetings with parents, and discussions with teachers.

Squash skills and fitness are also assessed regularly. Two of our students won their divisions (BU17 & BU13) at the SEA National Squash Championships in 2013 and another the BU19s in 2018 - amazing achievements - but the accomplishment that we are most proud of is that we have helped 25 students become the first members of their family to go to college, and 23 students receive scholarships to local private schools (Laguna Blanca, Crane, and Garden Street Academy), with a combined total of over \$5 million in grants and financial aid.



ABOUT SBSOS

SBSOS is a year-round sports, education, and mentoring program serving committed Santa Barbara youth (5th-12th grade) who qualify for the National School Lunch Program. SBSOS pillars include **squash, academic tutoring, community service, enrichment opportunities**, and **mentoring**. We operate after school, on weekends, and during holidays. By using squash as a motivator, we guide students to realize their academic, athletic, and personal potential. Our goal is for each student to graduate from high school prepared for their next step: college or to launch a career. We stay in contact with graduates as they work toward their post-high school goals, and offer guidance and support through age 25. We are closely involved with each student and their families on many levels, and describe the program as **"an inch wide but a mile deep".**



SEA's mission is to lead, launch, and strengthen youth programs that enable and empower students from under-resourced communities to access and succeed in quality educational, athletic, and career opportunities. SEA achieves their mission, through focusing on three primary areas — growth, program quality, and student and alumni opportunities. SBSOS goes beyond SEA's guidance to create unique programming tailored to its students and provides various opportunities for them to grow in all areas.

The Changemakers Tour was the opportunity of a lifetime for me. Cities like New York, Philadelphia and Washington D.C seemed like worlds away from someone like me, however SBSOS made traveling to those places something tangible for me. While solely being in those cities is enough to take my breath away, SEA went a step further and connected me with people I have dreamed of speaking to. Through the trip I have made lifelong connections with both the faculty and the students that attended the trip.

The tour started with a visit to the New York City Botanical Gardens where we got to meet with Arvolyn Hill who speaks on the impact the agricultural industry has on communities of color. While we were conversing with her she explained that she makes it her mission to introduce families of color-especially those located in The Bronx-to the beauty of nature. She spoke on her experience growing up in a family that thrived in nature, one that regularly went on hikes and enjoyed camping. I, and many other students, found ourselves relating to her when she spoke about the imposter syndrome she faced when in the Whitedominated space of nature. Later that day we went to visit the NBC studio. While it was jawdropping to see Jimmy Fallon's desk, and fascinating to see how desolate the studio had become since the writers strike, it was the NBC Nightly studio that took my breath away. In the modern age of fake news it is difficult to find news outlets that deliver unbiased coverage, however NBC is one of them. For years now I have sat down to watch the nightly news and now, suddenly I was in the studio.

The next day felt like a fever dream. If I had to choose between going to Disneyland or going back into the New York Times building, it wouldn't even be a competition. From watching the sunset over the Hudson River to walking the halls of the White House, I made no shortage of memories during this trip. 




ACADEMICS

15 years ago a small group of SBSOS students were fortunate enough to visit Yosemite and some still talk about the experience today. Last year SBSOS supporter Don Fuhrer donated the seed money for us to take 20 students back there and it was without a doubt the highlight of the year, so when he offered us the same opportunity this year we jumped at it, and with his donation plus that of Geof and Laura Wyatt and some other supporters we took 18 students once again. And once again it was an amazing trip and experience! Thank you to everyone who made this trip possible.

The 18 students, 11 boys and 7 girls, ranged in age from 7 th graders to one in her second year of college, and were accompanied by 4 chaperones - SBSOS Executive Director Robert Graham, SBSOS Academic Director Jennifer Sotelo, long time SBSOS volunteer Daniel Reisman, and the fiancée of SBSOS Program Director Miguel Nava, Alex Guerrero, who still went despite Miguel having to drop out at the last minute.

Our five days and four nights were managed and overseen by Yosemite's NatureBridge program who did an excellent job of combining fun activities with educational ones every day from 7am to 8pm. There were daily hikes and nature walks together with team-building games, adventures, and competitions. In between and after these activities the students and chaperones found many varied ways to enjoy their free time.

Home base where we stayed was a private NatureBridge site with dormitory-style cabins for sleeping plus bathroom facilities, and a dining hall. Breakfast and dinner at the camp site were amazing, and they provided packed lunches for us each day to take on our hikes, some of which were close by and some of which we drove to.

A new feature this year was a two hour photography class provided by the Ansel Adams Gallery, that we also got to tour, thanks to SBSOS Board member Frank Huerta, which really helped us improve the quality of the already stunning scenic photos we were taking.

With the massive amount of snow that fell this year there was a lot more water than last year so our trips to the river and the falls were very memorable, as was the climb to the top of Lambert Dome that almost all of us made (!!) where there were stunning views across the park and valleys.



NEW SQUASH COURTS IN SANTA BARBARA

When we lost our squash courts in 2022, we quickly found new homes for our programming, adding additional days at the Westside Neighborhood Center and the YMCA as well as adding a new venue at Garden Street Academy. We replaced squash with soccer, basketball, volleyball, circuit training, spongeball squash, and badminton!

The SBSOS kids were amazing and took this change in their stride. Although they missed playing squash on a regular basis, their attendance remained strong, and it made our weekend trips to squash tournaments and events all the more special. Remarkably, they managed some impressive results without practicing too!

Although the loss of the courts was a harsh blow, it will result in a much better future for us in the long term. We are working on three options currently:

1) We will be embarking on an \$8M capital campaign towards the end of 2023 to fund construction of our own community squash center, similar to the facility of our sister program, Access Youth Academy, in San Diego.





2) The YMCA has agreed to convert one racquetball court to a squash court (and hopefully more to follow soon after.)

3) We have made good progress in talks with the City of Santa Barbara with regard to installing an outdoor court (or two) in a local park.
